Gallery 44 is thrilled to bring the work of Norwegian artist Else Marie Hagen to Canada for the first time. Hagen's astute use of visual language crosses cultural boundaries and brings a new perspective to our centre for contemporary photography.

Having created sculptures that appear to be made of photographs, and photographs that appear to be made of sculptures, the Norwegian photographer Else Marie Hagen presents a series of works that oscillate between depictions of three-dimensional and two-dimensional space, challenge the distinction between the surface of the image and the subjects they represent, and deliberately obstruct viewers' identification with, or imaginary access to the image.

Each of the works that appear in this exhibition references different histories of representation such as landscape painting, medieval icon painting, and glamour photography, intervening into the construction of pictorial space. Cumulatively, her works explore the unstable relationship between the image as surface and the image as object, creating the uncanny effect that her subjects appear to be trapped inside the image. After viewing these works it isn't altogether clear whether we're *inside* or *outside* of the world images create for us.

ABOUT THE ARTIST

Else Marie Hagen, born 1963 in Stavanger, Norway, works with photography and photography based installations. Based on a conceptual approach, Hagen's work explores and analyzes features of today's normative visuality. It questions the image, both the meaning that might be derived from its formal qualities and the condition of the image as it appears in a wider social context. Hagen's work has been acquired by public and private collections in Norway such as The National Museum of Art, Architecture and Design, Nordnorsk Art Museum, Bergen Art Museum, Preus Museum, Statoil Art Collection, Storebrand Art Collection, Nordea Norway Art Collection.

ABOUT THE WRITER
